Recommendation

- 1. Find that the proposed action is not a project under CEQA
- 2. Support the Vine Trail Coalition's application to the Active Transportation Program.
- 3. Support increasing the amount of funding available through the Active Transportation Program.

ENVIRONMENTAL DETERMINATION

The proposed action is not a project as defined by 14 California Code of Regulations 15378 (State CEQA Guidelines) and therefore CEQA is not applicable.

Background

The District and the Vine Trail Coalition entered into a Memorandum of Understanding in March 2009 that essentially states that the District supports the Vine Trail and will provide assistance where useful and feasible.

The Active Transportation Program is a relatively recent State program that consolidates most federal and state money available for non-motorized paths into one program administered by Caltrans. As a result of this restructuring, only paved bicycle and pedestrian paths are likely to be competitive for ATP funding. The Vine Trail is an ideal candidate for ATP funding, and the Vine Trail Coalition is planning on seeking ATP funding in the next funding round. Applications are due June 1, 2015. The District has no eligible projects that are sufficiently developed for the District to meet this deadline. For these reasons, staff recommends the District continue to support the Vine Trail's application to the ATP.

A coalition of non-profit organizations led by the Rails-to-Trails Conservancy is working to further increase the amount of funding in the ATP. The coalition is advocating for a portion of the state's cap-and-trade revenues to be allocated to the ATP. This could be useful in the future, both to the Vine Trail, but also to the completion of the Napa River and Bay Trail between American Canyon and Napa. Staff recommends the District support efforts to increase funding for the ATP.

ENVIRONMENTAL DETERMINATION

The proposed action is not a project as defined by 14 California Code of Regulations 15378 (State CEQA Guidelines) and therefore CEQA is not applicable.

Background

At the Park and Open Space District Advisory Committee of April 2, 2015, the committee provided initial feedback on the District's purposes, track record and future goals, reviewed budget projections, and began the process of developing recommendations for the future funding of the District.

The information and projections developed for the committee are consistent with prior materials projections provided to the Board, but are more detailed and current. This newer information is attached to this memo so that the Board has the most current and complete understanding.

Exhibit One shows the history of District funding. This chart was previousl distributed to the Board; the only difference is that it now includes the expected County grant amount for the next fiscal year.

Exhibit Two projects future annual funding needs. Expenses are broken into the cost for general administrative purposes, the cost to complete and operate a Core Park System, and the cost for three enhancements to the Core Park System. The Core Park System is a subset of the more than 60 projects identified in the District Master Plan. The 10 parks and trails that compose the Core Park System have already received considerable District attention and funding. Potential enhancements

to the Core Park System include expanded environmental education programming, expanded land conservation, and completion of the Bay Area Ridge Trail.

Exhibit Three includes estimates of the level of funding that could be generated from various sources.

Several key facts can be extrapolated from this information:

- The existing County grant to the District that utilizes Transient Occupancy Tax revenues is sufficient to cover basic administrative costs and operation of the Core Park System (assuming minimal improvements beyond what is on the ground today).
- Once operating and maintenance costs are accounted for, there will be only a small amount of discretionary funding (under \$100,000/year) available for future capital needs to complete the Core Park System and for any enhancements to the system (further open space protection,, environmental education programs, or completion of the Bay Area Ridge Trail segments that are outside of the Core Park System)
- Although the District has in the past been successful in leveraging the County grant with other grants at a three to one ratio, this success rate in leveraging funds is considerably higher than is the norm for other agencies. Going forward, the District cannot count on such a high rate of success in obtaining outside grants, especially considering the limited amount of local funding that will be available as local match for state and federal grants.
- Without new funding sources, it could take 100 years or more to fully complete the remaining acquisitions and improvements needed for the Core Park System.
- An expanded environmental education program is estimated to cost an addition \$740,000/year. Assuming the District could provide an expanded program at the same cost per student as is the case for the District's past efforts, this amount of funding would provide for one field trip per year for each of the approximately 23,000 K-12 students in Napa County.
- An expanded land conservation program is estimated to cost \$250,000/year to administer, and \$41 million to implement. This estimate is based on staff knowledge of what it would cost in today's dollars to acquire from willing sellers the most significant of the priority conservation areas identified in the District Master Plan and related planning documents, as they become available over the next two decades. A reasonable assumption for planning purposes is that approximately half of the cost of acquisition can be obtained through competitive state, federal and foundation grants.
- Completion of the Bay Area Ridge Trail within Napa County is estimated to cost \$15 million. Most of this cost is for acquisition of land or easements not covered by the proposed expanded land conservation program.
- A new parcel tax dedicated to the District would enable the Core Park System to be completed more quickly, and could also fund an expanded land conservation program. However, it would not be sufficient to fund a meaningful land conservation program.

- A new property tax supporting the issuance of bonds would speed the completion of the Core Park System, but could not be used for the environmental education program, and would only fund a limited land conservation program.
- A ¹/₄ cent sales tax over 20 years would be sufficient to complete the Core Park System and all three of the identified enhancements (environmental education, land conservation and completion of the Bay Area Ridge Trail in Napa County).
- The degree to which any new revenues are shared with other agencies that have compatible but different priorities than the District (eg, funding for city parks, funding for continued Napa River restoration) would reduce the amount of revenue available to the District, and thus extend the length of time necessary for the District to complete the Core Park System and protect key open space lands.

Background

Ranger Sandy on Marilou - now at Bothe and beginning to work! Thank you to all the members of our community who made it happen and a big "shout out" to Montelli's that generously picked up Marilou and trailered her home.

Bothe-Napa Visitor Center work has begun! The unsafe back staircase and landing has been torn down, old wood hauled away and new delivered for a new staircase and smaller landing deck. We are getting bids to paint the building.



Restoration of the Historic Cabins is finally underway!

Seasonal staff is onboard and completing their training.

Earth Day Network's year-round mission is to broaden, diversify and activate the environmental movement worldwide, through a combination of education, public policy, and consumer campaigns. In appreciation of our natural world, we are planning a small **Earth Day Remembrance at Bothe-Napa April 25th**. For one day, we will offer annual passes at a \$20 discount (cost reduced to \$50). Naturalist Jonny Ehlers will lead hikes along the creek, in the Redwood Grove

and along trails gently educating our visitors about the amazing and diverse natural environment at Bothe and encouraging stewardship of our parks.

We are working with **Napa County Landmarks** to develop an annual family event at the parks. This year we will gather August 22nd for a small, test version of what we hope will be a successful two-day family activity day in the parks every August starting in 2016. We are envisioning a gather of camper clubs, oldtime car clubs, groups/families having fun in Yurtville, swimming, outdoor education activities for kids, docent led hikes, tours of the mill along with a few period correct life-skill demonstrations, and more. We hope to provide an authentic, old-fashioned, family-fun day in the parks. Profits will be shared.

In 2014 nearly 6,000 people looked up Bothe-Napa on **YELP** – an 11% increase over the year before. Marketing and good weather have helped. We continue to average 4 out of 5 stars – our hard work and dedication is showing. The only complaints are about the poison oak. (Although it is lovely in the fall!)

Our **TripAdvisor** ratings are also good: Bothe-Napa ranks #22 out of 58 things to do in Calistoga. Our overall rating is 4 stars out of 5.

We have repaired the leaks and breaks in the water lines that were damaged in many places by vandals. The electrical lines have been repaired and a new amp box installed for the caretaker's RV. The new liner is in place in the redwood water tank and the tank is full. While the house remains unlivable due to vandalism and neglect, the site is ready for the host caretaker to take up residence.

Bale Grist Mill

We are developing a projected 5-year maintenance plan for the mill buildings. Accordingly, are getting bids for a new waterwheel pump and the materials needed to repair/replace the shrouds and siding.

Plan of Projects Status Report

Name of Project Description Status The Bay Area Ridge Trail Council obtained a donated easement from the Tuteur family and constructed a section of Bay Area Ridge Trail adjacent to Skyline Park. The Bay Area Ridge Trail Tuteur Loop Council wishes to transfer this easement to the District. Staff for the District and Council have gathered all the relevant documents, and initiated discussion with the Tuteur Assignment of Tuteur Loop Ridge Trail easement family to determine if there are any issues or amendments that should be considered. Next steps are to complete legal review of the documents, make amendments if from the Bay Area Ridge Trail to the District warranted, obtain the consent of the Coastal Conservancy (who funded the trail construction), and then execute the assignment. Staff will resume work on transfering the easement to the District once the option agreement for purchasing a portion of the Kirkland Ranch is executed. Bay/River Trail -- American Canyon to Napa An 8+ mile recreational trail between the cities of American Canyon and Napa generally following the Napa River and interior levees of associated wetlands. Phase Two--Green Island Road to Soscol Ferry Questa has largely completed a revised draft PUC permit application for a public crossing of the SMART tracks, SMART, NRCA and the PUC have verbally agreed to allow the Road railroad crossing. LSA Associates has completed a biological survey for the Fagan Marsh area; based on the results. DFG has indicated they do not want the trail alignment to follow the levee on the north side of Fagan Marsh; District staff is reviewing the feasibility of an alternative alignment. After 4 years of back and forth, in July 2014 DFW informed the District that it would comply with the BCDC condition for public access north of Green Island Road by removing a fence and graveling the surface of the existing levee, despite concerns about this alignment expressed by the Napa County Airport and the FAA. DFW put this project out to bid in late August, has awarded the bid, and is now waiting for sufficiently dry weather to do the work. The fence was removed and gravel installed by DFW around February of 2015. Phase Three--Soscol Ferry Road to Napa Pipe The construction contract was awarded by the Board on September 8, 2014. The Caltrans encroachment permit and permission to use a parcel owned by Napa Redevelopment Partners as a construction staging area have been approved. The Notice to Proceed was issued on October 6, 2014._Construction was completed in November 2014, pending final inspection. The project will be complete as soon as directional signs are installed and grant invoices completed. Due to insufficiently warm weather, the quarry fines stabilizer did not properly set up before the major rains in December 2015; the contractor will make repairs and reapply stabilizer as soon as we have about a week of warmer weather. The contractor finished the project the last week of January 2015, and final payment was made in April 2015. The contractor will need to return in the summer of 2015 to reapply stabilizer in those spots where it didn't set up due to cold and wet weather. Berryessa Estates The District in 2009 applied to BLM for a no-fee transfer of this property to the District for the no-fee transfer of this property; while this transfer has received conceptual approval by BLM staff, the formal approal has dragged; several meetings have been held over the past three years to try and speed to process, but BLM staff has so far had Acquire 480 acres next to Berryessa Estates from higher priorities, CDF crews did extensive fire break work in 2009 through 2011 to protect the residences next to the BLM land. In February staff talked with BLM and was assured that processing of the transfer was now beginning. BLM did a series of site visits June-August, Estates and Pope Canyon. 2013. The Bureau of Reclamation in June 2013 asserted that Reclamation has property rights such that BLM is not permitted to transfer the property. BLM is now projecting the transfer will be complete by the end of this calendar year. In late August Reclamation determined they still retained jurisdiction, but they have committed to completing the transfer in the same time frame as BLM would have. Staff has submitted additional materials to Reclamation which is now processing the permit. Reclamation provided a draft agreement to the District in February 2014 which will lead to Reclamation eventually transferring its interests in the property; District staff responded with comments to the draft in early March 2014. Not willing to keep waiting for the federal agencies to resolve their differences, Napa County has acquired a property within the Lake Berryessa Estates subdivision for constructing the fire sub-station. Berrvessa Vista Volunteers working with the District have completed detailed GIS mapping showing all existing roads, creek crossings, vista points and potential campsites. Continuing Planning and stewardship of this 224 acre wilderness damage by off-road vehicles trespassing on the property was noted. The District sent a letter was sent to all property owners in that area introducing the District, explaining the deed restriction prohibiting off road vehicles, and asking for their cooperation. Since then there has been less observed damage, although the problem is not resolved. park Staff was planning on installing a gate to restrict OHV access, but this has proven infeasible. After observing more OHV damage in the summer of 2013, staff is exploring options other than a gate to prevent unauthorized OHV use. The latest plan is to install remote cameras in an attempt to determine who is causing the damage. No other work is anticipated until Lake Berryessa Trail planning is completed, as that is a key step in gaining overland access to the property. District staff has been meeting with Reclamation, their consultants and interested parties on the trail planning and prioritization. Staff in late June 2014 toured an adjacent parcel with the owner of the property; in September the owner indicated they are interested in selling the property for addition to Berryessa Vista Wilderness Park. The Land Trust of Napa County has obtained the appraisal of the property, and the land trust and the sellers have agreed on the appraised value as the sales price. The District Board in November 2014 agreed to acquire the property from the Land Trust at a later date when funding is available. Escrow closed and title transfered in early 2015.

Blue Ridge/Berryess Peak Trail

Obtain right of way and construct trail to provide public access to extensive federal lands on Blue Ridge and to Berryessa Peak Obtained donated trail easement from the Ahmann family to close gaps between existing public lands on Blue Ridge. A Negative Declaration and Use Permit hearing was approved December 16, 2009 by the County Planning Commission. An Operations and Management Plan has been approved by the property owner and the District. BLM staff on April 11th inspected the proposed trail alignment where it crosses BLM land. District and BLM staff met on August 5, 2011 to discuss BLM review of this project. BLM's biologist inspected the alignment on September 17, 2011. There have been volunteer trail building work parties have been held numerous times between 2011 and the present, and the trail is now done except for signage and a fence crossing. District staff met with Fish and Game on June 15, 2012 to discuss signage at the trailhead on DFG property, and in November 2012 submitted signage language for DFG review. Staff contacted DFG (now DFW) in February of 2013, again in early April, and again in late summer_to determine the stafus of their review. In January 2014 DFW staff responded with an alternative entry sign design, which is still pending.

Camp Berryessa

Redevelopment of former Boy Scout Camp into a group/environmental education camp.

CEQA and NEPA review is complete, as is the Use Agreement between the District and Reclamation. A grant for \$50,000 to help with construction has been provided by the Mead Foundation, together with a \$1.5 million grant from the State Coastal Conservancy. A new water well was dug in October 2012--production is great, and quality is acceptable with minor treatment. Reclamation competed their review of the 90% plans and had a very positive meeting with District staff in late March 2014. The 100% plans were submitted to the District and Reclamation in early July 2014 and were verbally ok'd in mid August. To meet budget constraints, work on the planned black water leach field will be deferred to phase two or it may be deleted altogether. A \$1.7m construction contract was awarded to G.D. Nielson Inc on Napa in November 2014 and Ron Critchley, a retired County engineer, has agreed to serve as our construction manager & inspector on the project. District staff had a kickoff meeting with G.D. Nielson on December 2nd at which it was decided to break ground on April 1st; under the revised schedule construction will be complete in mid to late fall 2015. The Coastal Conservancy has agreed to extend the grant until January 1, 2016. A combination of Chino, Chris, District volunteers, and a Califre convict crew compoleted pre-construction tree removal and brushing in early April. Contractor mobilization is slated for April 9th and 10th and groundbreaking for the date of this hearing.

Appraisal completed in December 2014 and forwarded to WCB and State Dept of Real Estate for review and approval. The guestion of whether the property has legal access

was resolved in Decembe 2014 and the title company has issued a revised Preliminary Title Report indicating they will insure the right of access. Pending approval of the appraisal, the Wildlife Conservation Board is prepared to provide \$1.6 million toward the purchase. Additional funding is expected from the Wilderness Land Trust and from Tuleyome, leaving a funding gap of approximately \$50,000 for improvements. District staff has been negotiating a purchase and sale agreement with the owners of the property, which may be ready for Board consideration at the March Board meeting. The state Dept of Genereal Services in April 2015 rejected the appraisal; once we get the

Lake Hennessey North Shore Trails

Would open up several miles of existing dirt access road, and construct approximately 1 mile of new single track trail, into a loop trail system on the north side of Lake Hennessey, and connecting to the planned Moore Creek Open Space Park trail system. Mitigated Negative Declaration on February 14, 2011. A final lease agreement and operations plan was approved by the District Board in August 2012, and by the City Council in September 2012. Work was completed on the connector trail to Moore Creek in June 2013 and public response to the new trail has been very positive. A plan for fencing and signage improvements along the Hennessey north shore has been accepted by the Director of the Water Division. Installation of City-required fencing was completed in mid-April of 2014 and a crew of 12 hearty volunteers completed the installation of required signage and two kiosks on the weekend of May 17th. Volunteers in August installed wayfinding signs and improved a horse trough_and on September 13, 2014 removed a defunct suspension bridge, as part of our agreement with the City of Napa. Some signs still need to be designed and installed. Lake Hennessey North Shore Trails formally opened with a ribbon cutting on October 18, 2014. Staff is preparing the grading permit

Moore Creek Park Development

Development of open space park on 673 acres acquired by the District adacent to City of Napa watershed lands at Lake Hennessey to protect habitat, provide recreational trails, and overnight camping facilities.

Oat Hill Mine Trail

Various improvements to the historic Oat Hill Mine Road

The litigation holding up this project has been successfully concluded. Several of the trail sign posts have been vandalized and will need to be replaced. The District is continuing to work with Tuleyome on a project to clean up the Twin Peaks and Corona Mines, in the hopes this may enable the District to safely open the northern Oat Hill Mine Trail for public use. A volunteer crew did erosion control work on the trail in January 2013. Staff and volunteers in February 2013 to did a comprehensive evaluation of erosion issues on the trail, and experts from the RCD joined staff for another evaluation in early April. The City of Calistoga and CalTrans have restarted discussions about constructing a roundabout at the intersection of Highway 29 and Silverado Trail; the District is tracking these discussions to ensure that whatever design as adopted will provide adequate and safe access to the Oat Hill Mine Trail. The Bay Area Ridge Trail did some cleanup and minor improvements in late October 2013 to the staging area, and the lower 4 miles of the OHMT was dedicated as part of the Ridge Trail on November 10, 2013. The 40 acre Randy Lee Johnson property donation was completed in December 2014. Chino and a hardy group of volunteers made drainage improvements on the trail in late January.

Oat Hill Mine Trail

Transfer of 40 acre parcel from BLM

The District in 2008 applied to BLM for a non-fee transfer to the District of a 40 acre parcel at Maple Springs on the Oat Hill Mine Trail; this application is pending. Staff met with BLM in February 2011 to discuss how to speed up this transfer; another meeting with the same topic was held August 5, 2011. The District is still waiting on BLM to process the application.

CEQA on this project was completed several years agostaff has prepared a draft update to the Negative Declation due to the passage of time since the original approval. The project concept has been approved by the District Board, and was positively viewed by the Veterans Home administration. However, Veterans Home staff had been having difficulty figuring out what approval process is needed, because of ongoing discussions at the state level about the appropriate roles and future programs for the Veterans Home, and then key management staff at the Veterans Home retired in November 2010, so progress was delayed pending the filling of their vacant positions. The District will restart the process when other project priorities are under control.
Skvline Park	Permanent protection of Skyline Park	Three past legislative efforts to authorize sale to the County failed due to unrelated disagreements between the state legislature and administration. Separately, the County in September 2009 approved a new park overlay zone and an updated Master Plan for Skyline Park. A Draft EIR was released in late September 2013 for the proposed expansion of the adjacent Syar Quarry. The District Board approved comments on the DEIR at it's October 2013 meeting. The Final EIR was released in November of 2014, a public hearing was held on January 7, 2015, the matter has been continued to April 1st <u>and at that time was continued to an unspecified date</u> .
	Kirkland Ranch Acquisition of land and easements to protect Suscol Headwaters and construct Ridge Trail from Highway 12 to Skyline Park.	District and property owner have prepared a term sheet outlining the details of the acquisition, and the District has prepared and submitted to the owner the formal Purchase and Sales Agreement, which is now being negotiated with the substantial pro-bono legal help of retired chief deputy County Counsel Margaret Woodbury. Phase I of the acquisition is scheduled for July 2015. Funding for Phase I will come from Napa County in exchange for the County receiving an equal amount from the Priority Conservation Area program administered by MTC. <u>Caltrans and the US Fish and Wildlife Service are seriously looking in to the possibility of turning a portion of the property into red-legged frog mitigation area, which could involve substantial grant funding for property purchase and wildlife improvements. The Skyline Wilderness Park Citizens Association and the Tuteur family have been incredibly helpful, among other things, by making their properties available for frog surveying.</u>
Spanish Valley, C	rystal Flats, and Stone Corral Planning for open space donated by Bob and Evalyn Trinchero	The District took full possession of the properties on January 1, 2012. Staff met with key community leaders from Lake Berryessa Estates on February 6 and March 6, 2011. A public session was held April 21st at the Pope Valley Farm Center. The District has negotiated an easement across the District's Stone Corral property to resolve one of the clouds on the title to this land; this easement was approval by the Board at its October meeting, and has now been finalized and recorded. Staff met with the LBEPOA Board many times in 2011-2013 to discuss use of the Crystal Flats and Stone Corral areas. District staff has prepared a draft agreement betweent the District and the Association, which the Association has informally rejected. The well serving Spanish Valley was repaired in November 2013. The District also sealed up an abandon dry well bore discovered on the property. A group of 10 boyscouts GPS'd old ranch roads and 4-wheel drive tracks on the Spanish Valley property for us over the weekend of April 26-27 so that we can create a map of existing roads and trails. A contract for archeological surveying (a required part of the CEOA process) was completed by Tom Origer and Associates in in June, 2014. Staff completed a preliminary survey of the Spanish Valley racess road in late July 2012 and, while legal access to the property has been established, it does not appear that the existing road is located within the Spanish Valley Trail easement. In early January 2014 staff learned the affected parcels are for sale. Staff's cash offer to purchase half of the property in mid March was rejected and we have decided to be patient while the property owner attempts to find a better buyer (as we think it unlikely that there is one). In February 2013 several no tresspassing signs were installed in response to some evidence of illegal OHV use. The Crystal Flats sign was immediately removed and the lock on the gate removed; a more secure temporary lock has been installed, and staff is researching a new gate that will exclude ATV

State Parks Grist Mill State Historic Park

Operate Bothe-Napa Valley State Park and the Bale The District, with assistance from the Napa Valley State Parks Association took over management of the parks on April 1, 2012. A County permit for the pool was obtained in July and the pool was reopened immediately thereafter. The state completed installing 3 vurts in October 2012. The District has installed 7 additional vurts. Numerous volunteer projects have been organized (PG&E event improving the Mill, firewood splitting, hazardous tree removal, mowing, pool cleaning, native plant garden maintenance. historic orchard restoration, lots of trash removal, and in September/October a footbridge on the History Trail was repaired by the St Helena Kiwanis). A volunteer forestly management group has been formed and the District has acquired a boom truck and other equipment in support of their mission. Utility service accounts have been transferred from the state to the District. Work on an improved recycling system is nearly complete. Every septic tank in the park has been pumped clean, and sewer lines were located and cleared of root blockages. Two additional failed septic tanks were discovered in March and pumped clean. Nearly \$270,000 in gifts, grants and pledges have been obtained to assist with improvements at the parks. The District and State Parks have finalized an agreement regarding the "found" state money that provides up to \$537,800 in State funds being granted to the District to cover some salaries and two capital improvement projects (replacement roofs and AC overlay to the picnic area road). The deadline for using these funds was extended in June 2014, so the District will have time to fully utilize the grant. The District is sponsoring SB 170 (Wolk) which would exempt the mill from state food processing facility requirements so that flour from the mill can be sold as a food item; the bill has passed the Senate and all Assembly committees, but unfortunately in late July 2013 the Department of Public Health announced their opposition to the bill. After meeting with DPH, it appears they may be willing to agree to a workable compromise: this will take time to explore, so we have made the bill a two-year bill. Staff will be meeting with the author and Governor's office staff in late July. A contract to prepare architectural plans for the repair of the cabins was awarded in December 2013: the plans were submitted in February 2014 for State Parks approval. In March 2014 the district was approached by several organizations and individuals requesting that the District consider taking over management of Robert Louis Stevenson State Park: after approval from the Board, staff in June 2014 submitted a proposal to State Parks to manage some aspects of RLS: this proposal has received favorable response from the State Parks Superintendent and her immediate superiors; based on this review, District staff is now revising the agreement . A free admission day including the dedication of the Ridge Trail/Vine Trail junction was held on July 27, 2014. State-grant funded roof repairs and day use area roadways were completed in November 2014. Hiring for 2015 seasonal employees commences in late February.

Vallejo Lakes

Possible purchase of 1100 acres of surplus Vallejo Water District lands, of which 200 acres are located in Napa County

Discussions between the District, the Land Trust of Napa County, the County of Solano and the Solano Land Trust indicate a common desire to work together to purchase this property adjacent to Skyline Park. The City Council of the City of Valleio has officially authorized staff to pursue surplusing of the property. The City of Valleio has hired an appraiser to prepare an estimate of the property's fair market value, but this has not vet been released. The District GM, together with the County of Solano EO, in February 2012 each sent letters to the City of Vallejo formally expressing interest in the property and requesting notification per state law of any planned surplussing of the property. Sale of the property by the City has been delayed because of complications related to questions about how best to supply water to residents in Green Valley. The Trust for Public Land has expressed interest in assisting with the purchase of this area. Staff from the District and its partners met with the Valleio City Manager in April 2014: the surplusing process has become more complicated and the City does not anticipate any action in the near future, but meanwhile the City Manager appears open to working with us to figure out a mutually beneficial outcome. Staff had a very interesting meeting with City of Vallejo water division staff and a tour of Lake Curry in late May. The Lake Curry property can only be described as a jewel, and the City of Vallejo would clearly like to divest it. District staff is presently exploring a broad array of options, from an agreement under which the City would retain title and responsibility for the water system while the District would take over land magament at the lake to outright purchase of the property by the District or its partners.

A Class I bicycle/pedestrian path extending from Vine Trai the Vine Trail Coalition, of which the District is a participating member.

The District has entered into an MOU with the Vine Trail Coalition to provide assistance as requested by the Coalition in receiving funds, preparing plans and environmental Calistoga to the Vallejo Ferry Terminal sponsored by documents, constructing and operating the trail. The District, the Bay Area Ridge Trail, the San Francisco Bay Trail and the Vine Trail Coalition have prepared a joint Case Statement for the combined trail network for fundraising purposes. The District on Febuary 5, 2010 submitted an appropriations request for FY 2011 to Senator Feinstein, and a similar request to Congressman Thompson on February 26, 2010 on behalf of the Vine Trail Coalition. The District in April 2013 approved and sent a letter of support for the City of Calistoga's request for a grant from the Coastal Conservancy to plan the trail through Calistoga. The Board President in early June 2014 sent a letter of support for a Vine Trail federal "Tiger" grant to help construct the section of trail between Yountville and Napa. The District continues to coordinate with the Vine Trail on plans to route the Vine Trail through Bothe-Napa Valley State Park. A joint Vine Trail/Ridge Trail dedication event was held at Bothe on July 27, 2014. In March 2015 the Vine Trail initiatied discussions with district staff about the possibility of the District providing maintenance for the entire Vine Trail. Syar Industries in March 2015 entered into an agreement with Napa Pipe and the Vine Trail to provide an easement for the trail connection between Napa Pipe and Kennedy Park.

Recommendation

- 1. Find that the proposed action is not a project under CEQA
- 2. Support SB 317 if amended to include significant funding for the Bay Program and the Coastal Conservancy.

ENVIRONMENTAL DETERMINATION

The proposed action is not a project as defined by 14 California Code of Regulations 15378 (State CEQA Guidelines) and therefore CEQA is not applicable.

Background

Senator De Leon has introduced Senate Bill 317 which would authorize a \$2.45 billion park bond measure. This is good news for park supporters. However, as currently drafted the bill strongly favors southern California. Staff recommends the District support SB 317 if it is amended to include significant funding for the Bay Program of the State Coastal Conservancy. The Bay Program has been the primary source for grant funding for the District since its inception in 2006.

Other regional conservancy programs slated to receive funding in SB 317 include:

\$100 million for the Los Angeles River\$50 million to the Salton Sea Restoration Fund\$100 million to the Tahoe Conservancy\$50 million to the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy

More positive for our District is the proposal to allocate \$200 million to State Parks for grants to local and regional park districts including districts that manage State Parks. There is also \$300 million proposed for the Coastal Conservancy for grants for the protection of beaches, bays and coastal watershed resources. Depending on how this is defined, Napa could be eligible for this funding pot.

The latest version of SB 317 is attached.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 317, as amended, De León. The Safe Neighborhood Parks, Rivers, and Coastal Protection Bond Act of 2016.

Under existing law, various measures have been approved by the voters to provide funds for park, river, and coastal protections and programs.

This bill would enact the Safe Neighborhood Parks, Rivers, and Coastal Protection Bond Act of 2016, which, if adopted by the voters at the November 8, 2016, statewide general election, would authorize the issuance of bonds in an unspecified amount the total amount of \$2,450,000,000 pursuant to the State General Obligation Bond Law to finance a safe neighborhood parks, rivers, and coastal protection program.
