Recommendation

Adopt District positions on, and authorize the Board President and/or General Manager to send letters communicating the District's position on the following bills:

- AB 979 (Berryhill)—oppose
- SB 211 (Simitian)—support

Background

Assembly Bill 979 provides that the state fully occupies the field of hunting and fishing, and that unless otherwise expressly authorized by the Fish and Game Code or other state or federal law, the commission and the department are the only entities that may adopt or promulgate regulations regarding the taking of fish and game on any lands or waters within the state. The only exception to this preemption of local regulatory control is to protect health and safety "in those rare and limited instances where state laws and regulations have not already provided a reasonable level of public Health and safety, by allowing a local ordinance to affect the taking of fish and game within the territorial jurisdiction of the local agency, if the ordinance is both necessary to protect public health and safety and only incidentally affects the state preempted field of hunting and fishing. The ordinance shall not indiscriminately extend or apply to any area in which the taking of fish and game may occur in a manner that does not endanger public health and safety or to any lands or waters owned or managed by the state or federal government.

AB 979 would effectively prevent the District from setting any standards for how and when hunting could occur on District properties. While hunting and fishing may be appropriate at various District properties now or in the future, the proposed legislation removes the ability of the District to protect wildlife species, and limit access to sensitive environments, and from a practical standpoint makes all District parks serve first and foremost as hunting preserves.

Senate Bill 211 authorizes the formation of a special park and open space district in Santa Cruz County pursuant to Section 5500 of the Public Resources Code. The supporters of this legislation have closely followed the experience of the Napa County Regional Park and Open Space District; they have asked for the support of our District in that we are the most recently formed entity using this code section, and they believe our experiences offer valuable evidence in support of the approach envisioned by this legislation.

AMENDED IN ASSEMBLY APRIL 2, 2009

CALIFORNIA LEGISLATURE-2009-10 REGULAR SESSION

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Introduced by Assembly Member Tom Berryhill

February 27, 2009

An act to add Sections 1020 and 1021 to the Fish and Game Code, relating to fish and game.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 979, as amended, Tom Berryhill. Hunting or fishing: local regulation.

The California Constitution provides for the delegation to the Fish and Game Commission of powers relating to the protection and propagation of fish and game. Existing statutory law delegates to the commission the power to regulate the taking or possession of birds, mammals, fish, amphibia, and reptiles in accordance with prescribed laws. Under existing law, the Department of Fish and Game exercises various functions with regard to the taking of fish and game. Under existing law, a city or county exercises certain limited authority with regard to the regulation of fish and game for the protection of public health and safety.

This bill would provide that the state fully occupies the field of hunting and fishing. The bill would also provide that unless otherwise expressly authorized by the Fish and Game Code or other state or federal law, the commission and the department are the only entities that may adopt or promulgate regulations regarding the taking of fish and game on any lands or waters within the state, *except as specified*.

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The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 1020 is added to the Fish and Game Code,
 to read:

3 1020. (a) The Legislature finds and declares all of the 4 following:

5 (1) The California Supreme Court in In re Makings (1927) 200 Cal. 474, determined that Section $25\frac{1}{2}$ of Article IV of the 6 7 California Constitution, as currently set forth in Section 20 of Article IV, prohibits local governmental entities from regulating, 8 9 or interfering with, fish and game matters and places this 10 responsibility with the Legislature in order to conserve California's 11 fish and wildlife populations and permit the largest use of fish and 12 game compatible with the reasonable protection thereof. 13 (2) The Fish and Game Commission was established in 1870

13 (2) The Fish and Game Commission was established in 1870 14 to assist in the science-based management of California's fish and 15 wildlife resources. The California Constitution permits the 16 Legislature to delegate to the commission certain powers relating 17 to the management of fish and game, and the Legislature has 18 delegated to the commission regulatory powers over the taking 19 and possession of fish and game, as set forth in this code.

20 (3) Hunting and fishing are statistically among the safest outdoor 21 recreational activities, particularly as they relate to impacts on the 22 general public, and are already well regulated by the state through 23 mandatory safety requirements, weapons laws, and regulations 24 adopted by the commission. Additional local regulation is both 25 unnecessary and significantly impedes the uniform, science-based 26 administration of fish and game laws. Hunting and fishing activities 27 are also compatible with other recreational uses on many public 28 lands and waters throughout the state.

29 (b) In enacting this section and Section 1021, it is the intent of 30 the Legislature to affirm, subject to applicable federal law, the 31 exclusive legal authority granted to the commission and the 32 department with regard to the taking and possession of fish and 33 game and thereby ensure necessary comprehensive statewide 34 control by the commission and the department over all fish and 35 game matters for wildlife conservation purposes and the protection 36 of, and access to, hunting and fishing opportunities for the public. 37 It is further the intent of the Legislature to protect public health 38 and safety in those rare and limited instances where state laws and

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SENATE BILL

No. 211

Introduced by Senator Simitian (Principal coauthor: Assembly Member Monning) (Coauthor: Assembly Member Monning)

February 23, 2009

An act *to amend Section 5514 of, and* to add Section 5506.14 to, the Public Resources Code, relating to parks and recreation.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 211, as amended, Simitian. Regional district: Park district formation: County of Santa Cruz.

Existing law generally authorizes the formation of a district by a petition requesting the creation and maintenance of a district, describing the exterior boundaries, signed by at least 5,000 electors residing within the territory proposed to be included in the district, and presented to the board of supervisors of the county containing the largest area within the proposed district.

Existing law also-permits *authorizes* proceedings for the formation of a regional park district, regional park and open-space district, or regional open-space district in specified counties of the state to be initiated by resolution of the county board of supervisors adopted after a noticed hearing, and specifies the contents of the resolution, in lieu of the petition and related proceedings required under the above provisions.

This bill, in addition, would permit authorize the formation of a regional district in the County of Santa Cruz-to be, except as specified, if the exterior boundaries of the proposed district are coterminous with the exterior boundaries of the county and are initiated by a specified

resolution of the county board of supervisors, after a hearing noticed in accordance with specified procedures, in lieu of the petition and related proceedings required under the above provisions.

SECTION 1. Section 5506.14 is added to the Public Resources

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SENATOR S. JOSEPH SIMITIAN ELEVENTH SENATE DISTRICT

Fact Sheet (DRAFT) Senate Bill 211 (Simitian) Santa Cruz Open Space District

Summary:

Current law provides for the creation of an open space district in Santa Cruz County under the state's Regional Park, Park and Open Space, and Open Space Districts Law (Public Resources Code §5500 et seq.). SB 211:

- Authorizes formation of the district to be initiated by resolution of the board of supervisors adopted after a public hearing, in lieu of a petition and related procedures;
- Provides for the district board members to be elected in accordance with current law, but specifies that five district boundaries must be drawn according to supervisorial districts;
- Exempts formation of the district from the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Act since the open space district boundaries are coterminous with county boundaries, except for territory within the Midpeninsula Regional Open Space District;
- Requires the board of supervisors to describe the methods by which the open space district will be financed; and
- Authorizes the board of supervisors to provide for a single ballot measure or separate ballot measures on the question of formation, financing, or any combination of those questions.

Need for the bill:

The Land Trust of Santa Cruz County, sponsor of SB 211, wants exceptions to the state's open space district law that are similar to those in certain other counties. These provisions follow information provided to the Land Trust from Santa Cruz County residents. SB 211 responds to the Land Trust's desire to create an open space district that is based on this information.

Background

An ad hoc subcommittee was formed by the Board in 2007 to investigate the feasibility for and to design a proposal forming a non-profit organization to support the District. Subcommittee members Guy Kay and Tony Norris have meet several times with staff and with the assistance of Elizabreth Wroblecka have prepared a concept for how the organization would be structured and what its purposes would be (see attached). This concept will be discussed at the meeting.

NAPA OUTDOORS FOUNDATION

FACT SHEET

<u>Background:</u> The Napa Outdoors Foundation will be a nonprofit corporation whose purpose is to raise private funds and public support for the work of the Napa County Regional Park and Open Space District. The Napa Outdoors Foundation will accept donations of money, land, and in-kind services and will lobby for open space political initiatives when appropriate. The Foundation's fundraising efforts will include: corporate and individual gift solicitations, direct mail, grant writing, planned giving, events, and a membership program.

<u>Mission Statement</u>: The Napa Outdoors Foundation supports the Napa County Regional Park and Open Space District which provides opportunities for all Napa County residents and visitors to recreate, enjoy and learn about the County's exceptional natural environment.

Vision:

- All people who live in Napa County are able to have a meaningful experience in the natural world which enhances their health and quality of life;
- Residents support future policy initiatives to preserve open space in Napa County because they understand the importance of and tangible benefits from protected land;
- The economic vitality of the County is enhanced because visitors to Napa County not only appreciate the world famous wine and excellent restaurants, but through outdoor recreation also enjoy a direct connection to the natural beauty of the County that encourages them to stay longer and come back again and again.

<u>Programs:</u> The Foundation raises funds on an as needed basis to support special projects of the Napa County Regional Park and Open Space District. In addition, the Foundation annually raises funds to provide ongoing support for core program initiatives.

- 1. Campership Napa Outdoors Foundation raises funds to provide scholarships so that children from low-income families residing in Napa County can spend time at Moore Creek Park, Camp Berryessa and other District open space lands enjoying a variety of recreational activities and nature study.
- 2. Parks Express Transportation is provided to organized groups making it possible for all of Napa County's residents to partake in the natural beauty all around us. Examples of groups receiving funding for transportation to the great outdoors include Veterans, disabled, schools, and seniors.
- 3. Environmental Restoration Funds are raised to conduct habitat restoration on land and parks owned by the District. Areas in need of restoration currently include: Moore Creek Park, Berryessa Vista Park, and Napa River Ecological Reserve.
- 4. Trail Building One of the District's core principals is to provide public access to open space in Napa County along multi-use trails for hiking, biking, and horseback riding. The District owns the rights to several trails that it is working to improve and make accessible so all people can enjoy the benefits of outdoors recreation.
- 5. Membership Individuals and families can enjoy the many benefits of membership, including free or discounted access to park facilities, (parking, camping, etc) members-only events, and knowing they are supporting the protection and enjoyment of the natural resources of Napa County.

Feasibility study completed. Environmental review has been completed, and a Use Permit obtained, for the first phase of the project (American Canyon to Green Island Road. The District has been awarded a \$1,032,300 grant from the California River Parkway Grant Program; this grant was frozen in December 2008 pending resolution of the State budget crisis. The City of American Canyon has obtained an easement from the Department of Fish and Game for a spur trail that will provide a direct connection to the Napa River, and the City and District are close to an agreement with the Napa-Vallejo Waste Management Authority for another spur trail that would loop around the landfill. The County Board of Supervisors has approved \$50,000 for the District to complete CEQA for the remainder of the trail. The District has prepared a draft MOU with DFG for the phase one trail, which is now under review by DFG. <u>BCDC has been asked by the Bay Trail Project, the Coastal Conservancy and others to require DFG to enforce its condition that the Bay Trail be constructed on the pond 10 levee.</u>
Berryessa Estates	Acquire 160 acres next to Berryessa Estates from BLM at no fee through their Recreation and Public Purpose Act procedure. Would serve as a wilderness park for local residentseventually be the northern trailhead for a trail between Berryess Estates and Pope Canyon.	CDF and the Pope Valley Volunteer Fire Department have added a proposal to construct a fire substation on a corner of the property. CDF has indicated its crews will most likely be available to clear brush for a combined firebreak and trail. <u>A community meeting with about two dozen attendees was held March 10, 2009 at the Pope Valley Farm Center to get input from and determine level of support in the community. The draft R&PP application to BLM has been submitted. The District has completed the donation to the District of a small, 0.2 acre property that provides critical access to the northeast corner of the property.</u>

A key adjacent property is expected to be on the market in the coming year.

Based on this reconaissance, a revised easement description has been drafted, approved by the landowner and recorded. <u>Two retired professionals with experience in preparing botanical surveys and environmental</u> <u>review documents have volunteered to prepare the environmental review for the property this spring.</u>

The BOR has plans to temporarily operate primitive camping at the site this summer due to the temporary closure of up to four of the other resorts at the lake.

Improvements to the rental house and main ranch house on the property are in process. A joint VO-CAL volunteer weekend is scheduled for May 15-17 to reroute a section of the existing road/trail to remove it from the streambed. <u>VO-CAL held a two day crew leader</u> training session at the ranch house in March with about 20 volunteers. The County Road Crew has provided some excess gravelly soil to fill a low spots in the existing access road, and will do more in the future.

DFG has signed a landowner agreement to allow the work to proceed. The District is continuing to work with the Resource Conservation District on grant contract documents. One of the District's proposed partners, Acorn Soupe, closed its doors due to financial difficulties; the RCD will assume the student environmental education responsibilities which Acorn Soupe had been slated to provide. The District has assumed the County's role in managing the preserve under the joint management agreement with DFG.
