RECOMMENDATION

Approve the proposed Memorandum of Understanding between the Suscol Inter-tribal Council and the Napa County Regional Park and Open Space District

ENVIRONMENTAL DETERMINATION

The proposed action is not a project as defined by 14 California Code of Regulations 15378 (State CEQA Guidelines) and therefore CEQA is not applicable.

BACKGROUND

The Napa Open Space District works with many partners to support and implement the goals and objectives of the District. In addition to formal agreements on specific projects and programs, we have also entered into Memorandums of Understanding with long-term partners that describe mutual goals and objectives, respective roles, and the manner in which the partners intend to cooperate. These MOU's are non-binding, but have proven useful in providing guidance to staff as well as explaining to the public how these partnerships are expected to operate.

The District currently has such MOU's with the Land Trust of Napa County and with the Napa Valley Vine Trail Coalition.

Staff recommends the Board approve a third MOU, this one with the Suscol Intertribal Council. Both the District and the Council have a strong interest in preserving the natural and cultural heritage of Napa County. State law already requires a formal consultation process between public agencies and native tribal groups as part of the environmental review process that all public projects are subject to. However, while useful, this consultation typically happens after an agency has already identified project priorities and headed down a particular path.

The proposed MOU provides a basic framework for the District and the Council to more proactively share information, encourage advance consultation, and provide support to each other on matters of mutual interest.

The Suscol Intertribal Council was founded in 1972 and reactivated in 1992. The Council provides a forum for preserving and cultivating understanding of the region's cultural heritage. The 26th Annual Powwow at Skyline Park planned for Oct 5th is one example of the Council's work.

Memorandum of Understanding Between the Suscol Inter-tribal Council and the Napa County Regional Park and Open Space District

The Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is entered into this _____day of _____, 2019 between the Napa County Regional Park and Open Space District, a special district of the State of California ("District") and the Suscol Inter-tribal Council, a California nonprofit corporation ("Council").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the District and Council ("Parties") have compatible missions and share many goals and objectives.

WHEREAS, the Council was founded in 1972 and reactivated in 1992, seeking to bring healing between the existing population and the people who historically inhabited Napa Valley and nearby counties.

WHEREAS, the District was formed by the voters of Napa County in 2006 for the purpose of protecting, restoring, maintaining and enhancing, and fostering public knowledge and appreciation of the open space resources of Napa County. The District currently protects over 5,000 acres of open space in Napa County through fee-title ownership and 201 acres through conservation and trail easements, manages another nearly 3,000 acres of open space owned by other public agencies, and has built, repaired and/or now operates 53 miles of recreational trails. On average, more than 7,500 people are currently using District trails each month. The District operates two campgrounds (one for family camping, one for youth-group camping), and provides outdoor educational and recreational programming. The District is committed to supporting community engagement; since inception, the District has organized over 96,300 hours of volunteer service.

WHEREAS, due to their common and compatible missions and responsibilities, as well as their unique capabilities, the parties wish to cooperate as described in this MOU.

TERMS

- A. Planning.
 - 1. Each party will develop its own plans and priorities, but will share non-confidential information and cooperate in the development of maps, data and plans for the purpose of advancing the shared mission of the parties to protect important open space resources in Napa County and facilitate their interpretation and appreciation by the public.

- 2. The parties will keep each other informed of potential projects of mutual interest as early in the planning process as possible.
- 3. The parties desire to go beyond the consultation process required by the California Environmental Quality Act and related State and Federal laws and regulations, by engaging in early collaboration to identify significant natural resources and cultural sites worthy of permanent protection, and to develop strategies for their protection.
- B. Outreach, Education and Marketing
 - 1. Each party will, as appropriate within their respective outreach, education and marketing materials and activities, describe the complementary and compatible missions and activities of the other party.
 - 2. When the parties cooperate on joint projects, the parties will also coordinate outreach and marketing related to that project.
 - 3. The parties will jointly seek to identify opportunities for interpreting the cultural heritage of the first peoples to inhabit Napa County, and where such opportunities exist, will cooperate in researching, describing and disseminating information about this cultural heritage.
- C. Fundraising
 - 1. Each party is responsible for obtaining its own funds, but the parties will, as appropriate, share with the other party information about potential funding sources, and will partner cooperatively on projects when appropriate.
 - 2. The parties may provide letters of support and take other supportive actions, as appropriate, to assist each other in obtaining grants and donations.
- D. General Terms
 - Independent Contractors. The parties to this MOU are independent contractors. Nothing in this agreement shall be construed to make one party liable for the actions, or failure to act, of the other party.
 - 2. Term. This MOU is effective the date first above written, and will continue until and unless it is terminated, by either party with 30 days notice.

RECOMMENDATION

Receive update, and reaffirm the District's approach to protecting Skyline Wilderness Park

ENVIRONMENTAL DETERMINATION

The proposed action is not a project as defined by 14 California Code of Regulations 15378 (State CEQA Guidelines) and therefore CEQA is not applicable.

BACKGROUND

Senate Bill 20 (Dodd) authorizes the sale of all or part of the State land upon which Skyline Wilderness Park is located, to either the County of Napa or the Napa County Regional Park and Open Space District, for use in perpetuity as a public park. SB 20 has passed the legislature; the Governor has until the end of Monday, September 9th (the day of this meeting) to either sign or veto the legislation, or allow it to go into effect without his signature.

Complicating matters, at the direction of the Governor, the State Department of General Services two weeks ago released a map showing State properties the Department considers potentially available for the development of affordable housing. Included in this map are 20 acres of Skyline Wilderness Park. These 20 acres encompass the relatively flat western portion of the park where the horse arena, equestrian skill training features, horse campsites and park maintenance facilities are located. This is also the area where most large events (including, for instance, Boy Scout camporees, Search and Rescue team trainings, and the Suscol Intertribal Council Powwow) take place.

The State has indicated that identified properties could be converted to housing through the State awarding long-term leases to private developers. By keeping the land in State ownership, the land and any development on it would be exempt from locally adopted General Plans and Zoning. However, if services such as water and sewer need to be extended to the property, those extensions could be subject to local policies and local discretionary decisions. The entirety of the Skyline Park property is, for instance, General Plan designated AWOS (Agricultural Watershed and Open Space) and zoned AW:SWP (Agricultural Watershed, Skyline Wilderness Park combining district), neither of which is consistent with urban development.

Skyline Park is entirely outside of the City of Napa voter-approved Rural Urban Line, which does not allow urban development on the Rural side of the line. The entire park is also outside of the Napa Sanitation District Sewer Service Area. However, because Skyline Park was historically part of Napa State Hospital, and Napa State Hospital has water and sewer service agreements that date back many decades (prior to adoption of the Rural Urban Line, or the County General Plan and Zoning), it is possible that no new discretionary action would be needed by either the City of Napa or Napa Sanitation District to extend water or sewer service. Staff is currently investigating these issues.

Meanwhile, Measure K has been placed on the March 3, 2020 ballot by the County Board of Supervisors at the request of the District. If approved by the voters, the acquisition and permanent protection of Skyline Park is the top named priority for the funding that Measure K would provide.

The operative language in Measure K states:

...protect Skyline Wilderness Park through acquisition from the State of California; no funds generated by this Ordinance may be used to support or facilitate any non-park use, development or resource extraction on any portion of the currently-leased area of Skyline Wilderness Park. The Napa Open Space District shall make all reasonable efforts to reach agreement with the State of California to purchase all of the currently-leased area of Skyline Park, and once such agreement is reached, shall use proceeds from the Ordinance as needed to complete the purchase.

The inclusion of 20 acres of Skyline Park on the map of state-owned property with affordable housing potential has generated considerable local confusion and controversy. Given the controversy, staff recommends the Board reaffirm its commitment to protecting the entirety of Skyline Park in perpetuity as a public park.

Berryessa Vista Volunteers working with the District have completed detailed GIS mapping showing all existing roads, creek crossings, vista points and potential campsites. The District sent a letter to all property owners in that area introducing the District, explaining the deed restriction prohibiting off road vehicles, and asking for their cooperation. Many miles of trails have been constructed, fencing installed, emergency communications capacity set up, repairs made to the two houses on the property, and invasive French broom removal has been ongoing. The eastern boundary survey and fencing project was completed June 2014. The property owner to the east of Moore Creek filed suit in June 2017 claiming the District owed additional money for the boundary survey and fence separating his property from ours. After several interim victories, the judge in early April 2018 issued the final ruling in support of the District's position; the District will now seek attorney's fees from the losing party. The "Dry Foot" Trail, including three small stone and trail building volunteer events focused on the Madrone Trail in late May and early June, 2018. Staff and volunteers in February 2013 did a comprehensive evaluation of erosion issues on the trail, and experts from the RCD joined staff for another evaluation in early April. The Bay Area Ridge Trail did some cleanup and minor improvements in late October 2013 to the staging area, and the lower 4 miles of the OHMT was dedicated as part of the Ridge Trail on November 10, 2013. The 40 acre Randy Lee Johnson property donation was completed in December 2014. Volunteers made drainage improvements on the trail in late January 2015 and work parties to install drain dips to control erosion were held in January and April of 2016. A PG&E contractor attempted to drive an ATV up the OHMT in early June, and ended up going into a gully; they promptly removed the vehicle and repaired the trail damage. Staff has been tracking and participating in the City of Calistoga's trail and parkway redesign project at the Vine / Silverado/ OHM Trail intersection. The lower 1/4 mile of the trail was repaired in early January 2019 by staff and volunteers, with an improved inboard drain, culvert and waterbars, to correct problems created by CalFire's 2017 buildozing. The next step is to conduct resource surveys, complete CEQA, and obtain permits. A botanist was retained in early 2016 to do a reconnaissance level survey of plant resources as the first step in planning for the property; his report was received in January 2017; the report describes the property as one of the best locations in the County for native grasses. US Geological Survey has requested permission to place a seismic monitoring station on the property; staff has worked with them to identify an appropriate location. In July 2016 the placement request was submitted to the Wildlife Conservation Board (WCB) for concurrence, which as the provider of the grant to acquire the property has the right to review such changes. WCB approved the request in August. An access agreement with USGS is before the District Board for approval at the September 2016 meeting. A group of 20- people from Tuleyome were given a hiking tour of the property. On March 4 2017, Tuleyome volunteers brushed the Iron Mountain trail (in the Cedar Roughs Wildemess, but accessed via Smittle Creek.) The State Fish and Wildlife Game Warden for this area has been most helpful in patrolling the property looking for illegal poaching. A well-attended volunteer clean up project was held on October 28th, more than filling a 30 yard dumpster with debris. In late May, field staff met with the US Geological Service to assist with the placement of a remote seismographic station on the property. Our volunteer caretaker for this property has made repairs to the dirt roads and the perimeter fencing.

Since then the District has obtained permits and done improvements to the pool, installed 7 yurts, instituted recycling in the campground and day use areas, pumped all septic system tanks annually, repaired the historic Wright House for use as a rental property, restored 5 cabins, constructed a new shower/toilet facility, and made a large dent in the backlog of deferred maintenance. District efforts to pass legislation allowing the sale of grain from the Bale Mill were unsuccessful. The District has de facto also taken on responsibility for Robert Louis Stevenson State Park, funding repairs to the Silverado House, working with State Parks to get a caretaker into that house to prevent vandalism. In 2014 the District started the process of extending the District S year Operating Agreement and including RLS in the agreement; approval of that new agreement is still pending. The existing OA expired on March 31, 2017; the District is now operating the parks on a month-to-month basis until State Parks can complete the new agreement. The draft OA is now undergoing final review in Sacramento. The District is working with the Vine Trail on the proposed alignment of the Vine Trail through Bothe. More detail on current activities are contained in a separate Parks Report for Bothe and Bale. A storage area at the vacant Silverado House in RLS was broken into in May 2018; State Parks has agreed to let the District repair the house and place a camp host/caretaker on site to prevent further vandalism. The well and water tank was repaired in late 2018, and a District employee is now living on site and serving as the caretaker. A tree fell on the Silverado House in the late Feb 2019 storms; this was cleaned up last week, but the roof which was already in poor shape is now leaking. Milling demonstrations occurred for the general public as well as festival participants. Overall a good event although no funds were generated from the event.
- Staff put up lighting, coordinated staffing and set up and cleaned up for the Annual Harvest Dinner Fundraiser organized by the Napa Valley State Parks Association. Lots of great silent auction items raised funds for the park at the best dinner venue in the Napa Valley!
- PEF's Status.
 - **Waterwheel Replacement**: Waiting to hear back about specialist comment/review.
 - Silverado Roof: State Parks responded that funding and staff from Bothe/Bale can't be used for repairs at RLS since we don't have an agreement to manage that park. We have challenged this determination with the District Superintendent and awaiting next steps. No response back on this. Proposed revised cost estimate to NVSPA to fund project.
 - **Site 40 Conversion to Host Site**: Plans were developed, submitting permit to County building Department. Scheduled to start construction Sept 24th.
- Staff attended the National Night Out event sponsored by the Calistoga Police Department on August 6th. NOSD had a booth and activity focused on park safety to tie into the event theme as well as promoting upcoming events.

- Staff participated in the Back to School Family Celebration event sponsored by Up Valley Family Center on August 30th. NOSD had a booth and activities while promoting upcoming events.
- Staff continues to promote and plan upcoming events (Fiesta en el Molino Bale and Old Mill Days).
- Staff completed repairs to Spring Trail landslide allowing access for hikers, horses and vehicles.
- State Parks started their Ritchey Creek Fish Passage removal project. The waterline in the creek has a temporary bypass, dewatering has occurred and contractor will be starting excavation of concrete structure.
